- ✓ Additional targets can then be set which will be shared with you during a separate meeting. These targets will be reviewed once a term.
- ✓ Your child may then use an IEP card in their lessons, with their targets on, collecting stickers when they are successful in making progress towards their target.

- English homework task set on a Thursday to be completed for the following Wednesday.
- Maths homework –task set on a Thursday to be completed for the following Wednesday.
- In Year 3, children will be expected to know their 3s, 4s, 6s and 8s – please learn these at home, using TT Rockstars if you can. They will do the MTC in Year 4.
- Spellings to be learnt and tested weekly (at least 3 sentences in their pink spelling books).
- Home learning projects are set half termly.
- Reading record to be signed Reading Race & 'opportunities'.
- Buddy club for homework is available. This can be booked through the school gateway.

Reading

- Expectation in Year 3 is that children read at least 3 times per week for at least 20 minutes each time.
- Ideally, they read to an adult, but we do understand that this is not always possible.
- Please record this in the diary (see next slide).
- Reading Race takes place every half term.
- Opportunity to read at lunchtime.
- Book bands books should come home by the end of the week (these are similar to the ones at AAIS, but not completely the same).

 - If an opportunity is needed to reflect about their behaviour.


