Uniform

Green jumper or cardigan with logo.

- Plain white short or long-sleeved school shirt with collar. Tucked in and buttoned up at the neck.
- Green and yellow striped tie clip on or tie.
- Grey, black or charcoal tailored school trousers.
- ► Grey, black or charcoal knee length skirts.
- Plain grey, black or white socks or tights.
- Green and white striped or checked dress knee length (Summer only)
- Traditional black low heeled school shoes. Velcro, laces, buckle or slip on only. No trainers.
- Hair must be fully tied back if longer than shoulder length. Hair ties should be black, green or muted colours.
- Only jewellery allowed is stud earrings. No hoops please. Earrings must be removed for PE.



Uniform

All pupils are expected to wear the appropriate uniform from home to school and home again, except when permission has been given because of school educational visits, or pre-arranged activity days, such as Comic Relief or non-uniform days. All pupils are representing the school at all times and should take pride in being part of their community.

If your child does attend school in uniform which does not conform to the agreed school policy, please note the following procedures will be followed: Class teacher will make you aware there is an issue with non-compliance of uniform policy.

2. If issue is not resolved, the year leader will make a phone call to discuss the noncompliance of uniform policy.

3. A letter from the Head Teacher will be sent.

 The school will telephone and arrange a meeting with a parent(s) or carer(s). This may or may not include the Head Teacher.



5. If, having met with the Head Teacher, there is still no improvement, the Head Teacher does have the legal right to send the child home until the correct uniform is worn. ** Any extended absences due to this will be recorded as unauthorised absence.

A typical week in Year 3...

Quiet play before school until Monday 18th September.

Maths – 5 times a week with one Times Table Rockstars slot.

Daily spelling, handwriting and reading for pleasure slots.

Reading – 4 times a week.

Writing – 4 times a week.

French, RE, PSHE, computing, Science, music and PE all taught weekly.

1 swimming block of 10 lessons for each class.

Geography, History, Art and DT – taught depending on the topic for that half term.



Assemblies daily.

Important things to remember each week!

Mondays:

- New spelling homework set (due in on Friday).
- Diaries checked for weekly reads (checking previous week)

Wednesdays:

- Maths and English homework due

Thursdays:

- New homework set online for English and Maths.
- PE and/or swimming
- Spelling test.

Fridays:

- Spelling homework due in.
- Celebration Assembly you will receive an invite if your child is receiving an award.




Homework!

- Maths and English homework is online via Atom Learning. Please do contact us if this is an issue and we can give paper homework instead.
- Spelling homework is completed in pink spelling books and includes practising their spellings and writing 3 sentences.
- In Year 3, children will be expected to know their 3s, 4s, 6s and 8s – please learn these at home, using TT Rockstars if you can. They will do the MTC in Year 4.
- Home learning projects are set half termly.
- Buddy club for homework is available. This can be booked through the school gateway.



Reading Expectations




- Year 3 are expected to read at least 4 times per week for at least 15 minutes each time.
- Ideally, they read to an adult, but we do understand that this is not always possible.
- Book bands children are assessed for their BB level and they can change their books daily (these are similar to the ones at AA, but not completely the same).
- Children should read their BB book on these 4 (or more) occasions. They can read a book of their choice the rest of the time if they choose to.
- Please record this in the diary (see next slide).
- We celebrate the children's home-reading efforts at the end of every half term.
- Opportunity to read at lunchtime if reads not completed by Monday or if diary is not in school to be seen.



Opportunities

- Not a detention!
- An opportunity to reflect (if it's due to behaviour) or complete work.
- Usually during lunchtimes.
- Given for three main reasons:
 - If children have not read 4 times at home (or diary is not in school to be checked on a Monday), they will be given an opportunity to read at lunchtime.
 - If homework has not been completed.
 - If an opportunity is needed to reflect about their behaviour.

Attendance

We have high expectations for attendance at HJS. We want to work with parents and carers to ensure all children achieve their potential. If they are to do this, it is essential that they attend school regularly.

- We expect children to have attendance of at least 98%, preferably higher.
- Parents should make sure children are in school by 8.30, for registration at 8.40.
- It is important your child attends every day so they don't miss key elements of schemes of work.
- If you need to make medical appointments, please try your best to do this outside of school hours. If that isn't possible, a written note is required.
