- Green jumper or cardigan with logo.
- Plain white short or long-sleeved school shirt with collar. Tucked in and buttoned up at the neck.
- Green and yellow striped tie clip on or tie.
- Grey, black or charcoal tailored school trousers.
- Grey, black or charcoal knee length skirts - not fashion skirts, i.e. pencil, stretchy or mini skirts



- Plain grey, black or white socks or tights.
- Green and white striped or checked dress knee length (Summer only)
- Traditional black low heeled school shoes. Velcro, laces, buckle or slip on only.

- All pupils are expected to wear the appropriate uniform from home to school and home again, except when permission has been given because of school educational visits, or prearranged activity days, such as Comic Relief or non-uniform days.
- All pupils are representing the school at all times and should take pride in being part of their community.
- ▶ If your child does attend school in uniform which does not conform to the agreed school policy, please note the following procedures will be followed:

 Class teacher will make you aware there is an issue with non-compliance of uniform policy.

If issue is not resolved, the year leader will make a phone call to discuss the noncompliance of uniform policy.

3. A letter from the Head Teacher will be sent.

4. The school will telephone and arrange a meeting with a parent(s) or carer(s). This may or may not include the Head Teacher.

5. If, having met with the Head Teacher, there is still no improvement, the Head Teacher does have the legal right to send the child home until the correct uniform is worn. ** Any extended absences due to this will be recorded as unauthorised absence.

Special Educational Needs

- ▶ If your child needs additional support in school then the class teacher or **Mr Proffitt** will contact you.
- Your child may receive 'school support' and be put on the Special Educational Needs register.
- Your child will have additional targets set which will be shared with you during a separate meeting. These targets will be reviewed once a term.

- Reading, SPaG and Maths set on Thursdays to be returned following Wednesday
- Spellings and sentences set on a Monday due in and tested the Thursday
- Science set on different days according to day taught
 one whole week to complete
- Reading -at least 4 times a week, 30 minutes each, signed by an adult for Monday
- ► Home Learning Task set every term, related to topics
- Homework diary signed by the teacher every Monday

Opportunities

- ▶ If homework is not handed in, an opportunity will be given at lunchtime.
- ► The expectation is for homework to be done outside of school time.
- ▶ If reads are not done.





Attendance

Of pupils who fall below 50% attendance, only 3% will achieve five A-C equivalent GCSE grade (including English and maths).

Of pupils who fall within 80 and 90% attendance, only 35% will achieve five A-C equivalent GCSE grade (including English and maths).

Of pupils who fall below 95% attendance, only 73% will achieve five A-C equivalent GCSE grade (including English and maths).

All children need to attend school and all children need to attend school on time.

We are here to help and support you in getting this right. If we are concerned about your child's attendance, we will speak to you.

Handwriting

At HJS, we have a scheme to encourage all children to do their best with their handwriting. As their handwriting improves, they will earn different types of writing tools.

The SATS: week commencing 13th May 2024

- Compulsory tests for end of Key Stage 2 all Year 6 children nationally
- ► GPS test
- Reading comprehension test (one hour)
- Maths tests three written papers without calculators, which includes an arithmetic test
- Writing no written test. Writing grade based on Teacher's assessment which is externally moderated
- Reading, Maths and SPaG test marked by external markers and returned at beginning of July - results will be in reports along with teacher assessment

- Put a note in the homework diary making sure your child remembers to show it to us!
- Speak to pastoral care



Moving up to Secondary School

Information on how to apply

School Admissions Team

Children's Services

How to apply.

- If you do not submit an application you will NOT be offered a school place.
- Application information will be sent to your child's current school in September.
- You can apply online from 1 September 2023.
- You can request a paper form from BCP Council.
- You must apply to the Local Authority where you live.
- You can apply for any school, regardless of where it is located.

Key Points

- We strongly suggest you apply for four different schools.
- List them in the order you want them your favourite should be listed first.
- Answer all the questions asked on the form.
- Make sure you name any sibling(s) on the application.
- Provide any evidence of religious faith if relevant.
- Check school policies and submit completed Supplementary Information Forms where relevant.

Key Points

- Make sure you provide your correct address.
- If you move house you must inform the school and BCP Council.
- Using a fraudulent address will result in any offered place being withdrawn.
- You have a right to express a preference for the school you prefer -Preference is not the same as choice.
- You must apply on time, by the deadline of 31 OCTOBER 2023.

Information about schools

- Look at statistics from previous years' allocations.
- Read the admission policies for schools you are considering applying to.
- Read our Parent's guide at <u>www.bcpcouncil.gov.uk/schooladmissions</u> from 1 September.

Academic testing – Grammar Schools

(For places at Bournemouth School, Bournemouth School for Girls, Parkstone Grammar School and Poole Grammar School)

- You can register your child for testing now.
- Registration for the grammar school tests closes on 8 September 2023 at midday.
- Registration forms can be downloaded from the schools' websites.
- You can also request a form from the schools directly or register online.
- Grammar school tests take place on 23 September 2023.
- Pupils will be tested in Maths, English and Verbal Reasoning.
- Test results will be posted by the schools in mid October 2023.
- Registering for and sitting a school's test is **not** the same as making an application.
- You must also submit an application to BCP Council by 31 October 2023,

Academic testing – Poole High School

(For the "Expressly Academic Class" at Poole High School)

- You can register your child for testing now.
- Registration for "Expressly Academic" closes on 16 September 2023 at midday.
- Registration forms can be downloaded from the school's website.
- You can also request a form from the school directly or register online.
- ▶ The test for the "Expressly Academic Class" is on 30 September 2023.
- The Expressly Academic test will include English, Maths and a Reasoning Test.
- ▶ Test results will be posted by the school in mid October 2023.
- Registering for and sitting a school's test is **not** the same as making an application.
- You must also submit an application to BCP Council by 31 October 2023,

Submit the application

Complete and submit an online application by Midnight on 31 October 2023.

Paper forms must be submitted and received by the Local Authority by 31 October 2023.
